Marseille is a place in France where the soldiers were fighting when the anthem was written.

and wives!






Spain

France

La Marseillaise is the French national anthem and was composed in just one night on April 24, 1792 during the French Revolution by Claude-Joseph Rouget de Lisle, who was a captain of the engineers and amateur musician. He had been asked by the mayor of Strasbourg to write a song that would rally troops to defend their homeland. The lyrics of the anthem are certainly defiant, and were sung by the troops as they marched from Marseille to Paris, leading to its title of **La Marseillaise**. The text in the poem has been translated from the original, which is in French.

Spain

The **Marcha Real** is the national anthem of Spain, which in English means 'The Royal March'. Amazingly, it is one of only four national anthems in the world to be completely instrumental with no lyrics. This anthem was first printed in a book dated 1761 and Manuel de Espinosa de los Monteros is the composer.



Germany

Today's German national anthem is sung to a melody by composer Joseph Haydn and is based on a poem. The anthem is called **Deutschlandlied**, which means 'Song of Germany' in English. The lyrics below have been translated from the original, which is in German.

Ireland

The Irish national anthem is called **Amhrán na bhFiann**, which translates to 'The Soldier's Song'. It was written in English by Peadar Kearny in 1907. The same year, Patrick Heeney composed the music to accompany it. The lyrics of the anthem imply that it is a rebel song, encouraging people to stand up for Irish independence. The text below has been translated from the original, which is in Irish Gaelic.
