1. Introduction

Thames View Junior recognises the valuable contribution that the wide range of additional activities, including clubs, trips and residential experiences can make towards students' allround educational experience and their personal and social development.

As a rule, any activity or material that is required as part of normal curricular activities does not incur a cost to parents (the term parent meaning a person having parental responsibility for a student). Where required the Academy reserves the right to charge parents in accordance with the provision of the Education Act 1996.

2. Voluntary Contributions

When organising school trips or visits which enrich the curriculum and educational experience of the children, the school invites parents to pay for the trip. If we do not receive sufficient payment, we may cancel a trip. If a trip goes ahead, it may include children whose parents have not paid any payment. We do not treat these children differently from any others.

If a parent wishes their child to take part in a school trip or event, but is unwilling or unable to make payment, we do allow the child to participate fully in the trip or activity. Sometimes the school pays additional costs to support the visit. Parents have a right to know how each trip is funded. The school provides this information on request.

The following is a list of additional activities organised by the school, which require payment from parents. These activities are known as 'optional extras. This list is not exhaustive:

- visits to museums;
- sporting activities which require transport expenses;
- outdoor adventure activities;
- visits to the theatre;
- musical events.

3. Residential Trips

If the school organises a residential trip in school time or mainly school time, which is to provide education directly related to the National Curriculum, we do not make any charge for the education. However, we do make a charge to cover the costs of the board, lodging and travel expenses.

If parents are experiencing financial difficulties, they are invited to write in confidence to the Headteacher requesting a reduced payment, it is at the Headteacher's discretion if this is agreed.

4. Music and Vocal Tuition

Although the law states that all education provided during Academy hours must be free, specialist music lessons are an exception to this rule. Charges may be made for tuition in

playing a musical instrument, and the teaching is not an essential part of the National Curriculum. Lessons can be for either an individual student or groups of any size appropriate to the lesson and health and safety considerations.

5. **Swimming**

All children do receive swimming lessons as part of the normal school curriculum. We may how ever ask for a contribution towards the cost of the travel.

6. Activities Outside School Hours

We charge a £18.00 fee for activities such as after school clubs that are outside of school hours; this contribution helps towards some materials plus activities that are provided by external agencies.

We charge an £1.50 fee for any child to attend breakfast club which is outside of school hours; any parents that have not booked a place for their child in breakfast club but the child attends then a £2.00 fee will be charged.

7. Remissions

Where the parent of a child is unable to meet any of the charges of the school, the parent can apply in confidence to the Headteacher for the remission of charges in part or full.

The Headteacher in consultation with the finance committee will make authorisation of remission.

8. Monitoring and Review

This policy is monitored on a day-to-day basis by the Headteacher, who reports to governors about the effectiveness of the policy on requite.

This policy will be reviewed every two years. The policy may be reviewed earlier than this, if the government introduces new regulations, or if there are recommendations on how the policy might be improved.
